

NEW EXPANDED GRANT PROGRAM

Vancouver Heritage Foundation is excited to present a new and expanded Heritage Conservation Grants program. Stepping up support with new funding from the City of Vancouver and private donors, VHF has built on its past programs to increase opportunities and funding for conservation of heritage buildings and sites in Vancouver. The Heritage Conservation Grants Program will provide a matching grant of up to a maximum of 50% of the eligible costs with a total of \$230,000 allocated for disbursement in the 2019/2020 grant cycle.


VHF gave its first grants to support heritage conservation projects in 1999 with the launch of the True Colours historical paint palette and True Colours grant. During the 20 years since then, VHF has sustained this important assistance to owners and stewards of heritage buildings and places, often the only financial support available for conservation work, with grants to 137 projects.

The new Heritage Conservation Grants program offers two categories of grants: Planning Project Grants and Conservation Project Grants. They can support owners or stewards in the care of their historic site with financial assistance and professional guidance, helping to achieve a high standard of heritage conservation to sustain heritage places for the long term and the many benefits they offer for communities. The application deadline for the 2019/2020 cycle is November 4, 2019. New and renewed incentive programs are also available for large scale heritage projects from the City of Vancouver, with grants of up to \$4 million.



GRANDVIEW HERITAGE TOUR







This September, VHF is offering a new tour, based on the successful model established with the 2018 West End Heritage Tour. Focusing on the area between East Hastings Street and East 1st Avenue, and between Clark Drive and Nanaimo Street, the tour includes ten sites all located near one another. The majority of sites offer private access to areas not open to the general public. Of the ten sites on tour, five are private homes, including a pioneering example of transforming a Vancouver Special.

NEW ARTWORK BY DEANNA BOWEN



On September 10th we launched the newest installation at the WALL, the 10th year of this public art platform. "Night Prowl" is part of a two-year project where artist Deanna Bowen researched a series of intertwined figures in Vancouver who formed an integral part of the Black entertainment community from the 1940s to

the 1970s. She mapped a constellation of nightclubs, theatres and hotels where they gathered, many of which have been erased from the city's physical fabric and collective memory but exist as traces in archives. "Night Prowl" captures part of a film frame from a CBC news story that aired in October 1959, reporting on the dramatic purging and forced closures of many nightclubs in Vancouver's ethnically diverse east end, a signifier of the calls for urban renewal that would displace and disperse Black communities.

PROVIDING RESOURCES FOR EDUCATORS

In consultation with schools, educators and heritage professionals VHF has drafted a Heritage Study guide to be available online as printable PDF documents. VHF will be presenting this new resource at the BC Social Studies Teacher Association Conference in October with an interactive workshop. Throughout the year, VHF will be reaching out to Vancouver schools, sharing the guide, offering class visits, field trip and book grants for schools, and sessions for teacher professional development days. We are inviting feedback, lesson input and projects that can be shared on our VHF Schools Program webpage. By connecting with young learners, we are working to increase students' awareness, knowledge and appreciation of Vancouver's local history and heritage places.

COMMUNITY HISTORY RESOURCE: UPDATED WITH NEW STORIES AND IMAGES



Over the summer we have worked to add personal stories to the Places That Matter Community History Resource. Through interviews and community connections we have incorporated new images and histories that expand the vibrancy of these sites.

Yada Apartments - During the Community Celebration in February we heard from Yada family descendants and the Nikkei Centre and Museum Archives about the last remaining Japanese-Canadian built apartments in Fairview. From the event, as well as a visit to the apartments, for some a first-ever visit, we gathered stories and images to add to the page.

Louvre Hotel - Wing's Café, a fixture in the community since the 1960s in the Louvre Hotel, announced they were closing in April. We were able to visit and chat with owner Johnny Leung. Johnny's family have served Chinese-Canadian cuisine and classic diner fare (with little inflation) to regular customers for decades. A testament to his importance in the neighbourhood, Johnny shared stories behind the gifts he has received over the years from loyal customers, along with many photos and handwritten notes of thanks.

Nellie Yip Quong House - Makers Artists United (MAU) and textile artist Jen Hiebert contacted VHF about a commemorative pinafore project featuring feminist and social activist Nellie Yip Quong (1882-1949). We were able to connect them directly with Nellie's daughter and grand-daughter. They marched in the 2019 Walk for Women wearing the Nellie pinafores. Photos from that event have been posted to the site.

SPRING RECAP

HERITAGE HOUSE TOUR 2019



On June 2nd, we hosted the 17th annual Heritage House Tour. This year we explored the evolution of Vancouver's heritage and character homes. The houses included the A-listed 1910 Arts & Crafts beauty Hirschfeld House and the 1895 home built for George Weeks that is now a calming wellness centre in a historic square. The homes spanned six decades of architectural design including handsome Victorian detailing, sturdy Craftsman construction and even influen-

tial Mid-Century Modern design. A highlight for many was the Downs Residence, a 1959 masterpiece designed by Barry Downs for his own family.

VHF COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Over the spring and summer VHF was involved in events that helped us reach new audiences and support heritage sites around the city. We partnered with several cultural organizations in presenting a series of Strathcona walking tours highlighting the diverse communities represented in the area. In May, VHF staff presented at both the AIBC and Heritage BC annual conferences. Then in July and August we worked with the Downtown Vancouver Business Improvement Association to present a series of fun, mid-century themed free pop-up events.

PLACE NAMES: A SPECIAL TALK & TOUR AT MUSQUEAM

In April we partnered with Musqueam to present a special opportunity to learn from Larry Grant, Musqueam Elder and Vanessa Campbell, of the Musqueam Language and Culture Department, about the language traditionally spoken by First Nations 6 communities in and around Vancouver, and how language connects to places, history and cultural traditions. Guests were welcomed into the Musqueam Cultural Centre and enjoyed a tour with Musqueam guide Alec Dan.

SPRING WALKING TOURS

Our walking tour series has continued to prove popular with many tours selling out months ahead of time. Tours featuring John Atkin's unique take on neighbourhood history have explored industrial history from the waterfront to Mount Pleasant, while John Belshaw told the story of Gore Avenue and Cedar Cove. Director of Community Engagement at the Jewish Museum and Archives, Michael Schwartz has led four walks highlighting contributions and legacies of Vancouver's Jewish community. Further tours were led by local historian Rob Howatson on history of the transforming shoreline of the Fraser River and by historical researcher Christine Hagemoen on the rich history of Mount Pleasant.

HERITAGE ENERGY RETROFIT GRANT

A renewal of the Heritage Energy Retrofit Grant is planned for launch this October. PUBLICATION GRANT

The deadline to apply for the Yosef Wosk Publication Grant is September 27th, 2019. Those with projects related to publications about heritage places and their conservation are invited to apply for up to \$10,000 to help make their project a reality. Eligible projects will have a tangible long-lasting product and aim to increase public awareness, knowledge and appreciation of heritage places or heritage conservation in Vancouver. Publications could relate to cultural landscapes or intangible cultural heritage as well as buildings, structures, districts and other places that have heritage value.
