VANCOUVER HERITAGE

VANCOUVER SPECIAL HOUSE TOUR



Back for its 9th year, the Vancouver Special House Tour offers a chance to get inside 5 examples of the now iconic housing style unique to Vancouver. With its basic floor plan and simple construction, the Vancouver Special lends itself to creative solutions and inventive ideas to adapt it to meet the needs of new owners. This tour serves as a showcase for how older housing styles can be transformed for modern living.

Among the homes on tour this April is a Riley Park 1976 Special that remains in the same family. It has received a thoughtful update with help from a pioneer of the revitalization of the Vancouver Special, Architect Stephanie Robb, artfully blending memory with modern for the current generation. Another stop on the tour will be a dramatic transformation of a 1970s Special into a sophisticated modern space with incredible wrap-around wood dining area that plays off the cedar ceiling.

Often utilized for multi-generational living, or as mortgage helpers, the possibilities for two full floors of living space are plentiful. On this tour, ticket holders will get to see some of the ways homeowners have chosen to personalize and adapt these family homes from the middle decades. You can learn about how to improve energy efficiency, speak to owners and experts in construction and materials and come away with great ideas for retaining and reusing older housing.

OLD SCHOOL WORKSHOPS & COURSES

Old School teaches homeowners and professionals skills and knowledge for the care and maintenance of older buildings.

This spring, Old School offers some favourites including *Researching the History of a Building* where attendees learn about the resources available at the City of Vancouver Archives and the Vancouver Public Library Special Collections.

Core course, *Heritage 101* also returns, offering a solid introduction to heritage conservation and its framework in Vancouver, taught by City of Vancouver Senior Heritage Planner, Marco D'Agostini and Heritage Consultants, Judy Oberlander and Donald Luxton.

A full-day workshop will take us through repairs, maintenance techniques and best practices for double-hung wood windows. The course is taught by Jim Stiven, founder of Vintage Woodworks, who has over 37 years experience.

Civic Historian, John Atkin will lead us on another intriguing *Neighbourhood Zoning Walk*, this time exploring Chinatown, one of the city's few official Historic Areas. John will explore the changes that have resulted in its current form and the social and economic pressures it now faces.

Since the inaugural tour in 2003, we've explored homes from Grandview to

Southlands, and the West End to Strathcona to Marpole. We've visited homes of former Senators, business leaders and even a Lieutenant Governor of BC. We have shared the important history of railroad and mill workers, mariners, small business owners and others who have been part of Vancouver's story. The tour has showcased a diversity of architecture from the 1890s on, ranging from catalogue homes to architect-designed mansions, purpose-built apartments and other buildings adapted to residential use.

Thanks to the generous homeowners who open their homes and the help of enthusiastic volunteers, the tour is a wonderful way to explore and experience Vancouver's history and heritage. As we celebrate a landmark year for the tour, we look forward to another group of wonderful homes that won't disappoint, so mark your calendar and be sure to join us!

PLACES THAT MATTER: ONLINE



This spring we will be launching a new website to share information and images relating to the 125 Places That Matter sites. We will be reaching out to all those involved with the project so far and to the wider community to add to the resources we already have for these community-nominated sites,

and hope to include more personal stories and photographs. This project is possible thanks to a grant from the Heritage Legacy Fund from Heritage BC.

The aim is to provide an accessible, mobile-friendly digital space to share history and community stories about significant places for residents, visitors, students and researchers who are interested in our city's cultural history. On October 23rd, the Places That Matter Plaque Project acknowledged Temple Sholom as plaque #85. Presented to Rabbi Dan Moskovitz in Trimble Park, the plaque has been installed near the original site of the Temple on West 10th Avenue. Community members gathered to reminisce and celebrate the history of the Temple's Jewish Reform congregation, and remember how a firebombing in 1985 led to relocation from Point Grey to the Oakridge neighbourhood.

HERITAGE SITE FINDER UPDATE



This past year, close to 40 volunteers contributed time and effort to one of our key educational tools, the Heritage Site Finder Interactive Map. Out of the over 2200 locations on the map, close to half now have text about their history, and more are produced each week. Our goal of sharing an image and information about every building and site on the City of

Vancouver's Heritage Register is within reach!

This progress would not be possible without the volunteers who have put in countless research hours.

WEBSITE RENOVATION



During a six-month internship with VHF, Archaeology Masters graduate Jessica Blesch coordinated an overhaul of the information resources on our website.

After assessing feedback garnered through an online survey, our web pages have been streamlined to make it easier to find information. New pages have been added with important and helpful resources and existing resources have been updated and added to.

Some key changes:

- All tours, lectures, workshops and special events are now found under the Attend An Event heading. If you are looking to purchase tickets or find information about an upcoming event, this is where to start.
- The Learn With Us heading is now home to important new pages such as the Building Owner's Guide, which provides resources for owners of heritage buildings, and Heritage Basics and FAQ's, a great starting point for anyone looking to better understand heritage conservation.
- There are also pages on policies and by-laws that affect heritage, papers by VHF, resources for discovering Vancouver's history and heritage, case studies on heritage and sustainability, and more.

If you haven't had a chance to tour our updated website, please do, and let us know if there are other resources you believe we should include.

MID-CENTURY MODERN HOUSE TOUR



In 2016, the Mid-Century Modern House Tour opened five homes that showcased the lasting influence of Modern design in homes built between the 1950s and 1980s. By bus or self-guided, ticket-

holders explored homes of the era including the muchtalked about Friedman Residence. This remarkable Frederic Lasserre home, with landscaping designed by Cornelia Oberlander, had been in the media as highly threatened due to its small footprint on a large lot. It was purchased by new owners and opened on the tour before any restoration work began. We also tested a new pricing structure to allow for a less expensive price-point allowing more people to attend and learn about this wonderful architectural style. A reception held at the Vancouver Maritime Museum was an added bonus for many and included a talk by UBC SALA professor and author, Christopher MacDonald.

LANEWAY HOUSE TOUR



At the 7th annual Laneway House Tour, over 400 people visited six unique lane homes all built behind existing homes, including one built as part of the restoration of the Walter and Mary Lee Chan

house in Strathcona. All the laneway homes showed different ideas on how these small residences can be part of the conservation of a character neighbourhood, allow families to stay together and offer space for new families to move in.

THE WALL: EMILY NEUFELD



The WALL at the CBC Plaza welcomed a new work by artist Emily Neufeld. Through her piece *Picture window*, Emily investigates the ways in which our homes are "repositories for our memories." Primarily working with sculpture, photography

and exploring spaces marked for demolition, Emily has found new ways of questioning the lived history of a space. An artist's talk in November officially launched the work and explained the meaning and process behind her practice.

CITY DRINKS: CASA MIA



On September 30th, 150 guests attended City Drinks, a now annual fundraising event that supports VHF programs and projects. Starting in 2014, we've enjoyed special evenings in remarkable heritage spaces including the Sun Tower, a 1912 Shaughnessy mansion

and now the historic Vancouver estate home, *Casa Mia*. With a special performance by internationally-renowned artists Roy & Rosemary, guests also enjoyed a silent auction and tours of the remarkable home. The evening raised over \$20,000. Thank you to all who attended and to those who donated silent auction items, wine and desserts.

A new round of conservation grants has begun with applications for 2017 due on February 1st. In 2016, four houses were repainted in historic colours through the *True Colours* program, while other projects benefitted from the *Restore It* program. Supported projects included roofing works and restoration of exterior cladding, wood windows and decorative brackets. The program also assisted The Mission to Seafarers Heritage 'A' building in replacing their 111-year-old drainage system.

2016 saw the successful completion of VHF's pilot *Heritage Energy Retrofit Grant* program. Ten pre-1940 homes completed energy retrofits. Participants achieved a range of annual greenhouse gas (GHG) reductions from 0.18 to 6.52 tonnes, with an average reduction of 2.1 tonnes. Program participants implemented over \$100,000 worth of retrofits and qualified for almost \$20,000 in rebates from the utilities.

The renewed *Heritage Energy Retrofit Grant* program has added support for storm windows, water efficiency measures, and continued guidance for the most appropriate and effective retrofits for older homes. The program covers most of the cost of home energy evaluations to qualify for the grant and utility rebates, and can help older homes significantly reduce their energy costs and increase comfort. VHF thanks the City of Vancouver for the continued funding of the program which helps older homes be more energy efficient into the future.

HERITAGE IN VANCOUVER

Chinese Society Buildings Update



In December 2015, Council approved the Chinese Society Legacy Program, committing \$3.6 million towards the estimated \$36 million needed to rehabilitate important historic Society buildings in Chinatown. This will be a long-term project requiring funding partners and fundraising to achieve. In the meantime, some work has begun including the exterior rehabilitation of the 1903 building home to the non-

profit society, Lim Sai Hor Kow Mock Benevolent Association, with help from the City of Vancouver's Chinese Society Matching Grant and Heritage Façade Rehabilitation programs. This phase includes roof and masonry repairs as well as façade work and is scheduled to complete by summer. The distinctive building is an example of the significant heritage resources in the National Historic Site, Vancouver's Chinatown.

Burrard Bridge



Installation is underway on the Burrard Bridge of the reproduction pedestrian lamp standards and sconces, restoring this aspect of the bridge to its 1932 appearance. The original lamp standards were previously removed and utilitarian

street lighting installed in its place. The new scheme includes modern street lighting on the outer side of the bridge deck. The much-debated new fencing is also being installed with a design aiming to work with the restored pedestrian lighting and minimize its impact on the view from the bridge. VHF is also working with partners and city staff to get the four brazier towers restored to their full impact during the next year and hope to have good news on progress soon. The braziers are a dramatic and poignant part of the bridge as they were conceived by the bridge engineer and the architect, both WWI veterans, to commemorate the sacrifices of the War.

Character Home Zoning Review



Through November and December, the City of Vancouver held open houses and an online survey in a public consultation process on potential ways to improve retention of character homes in single-family areas. The consultation focused

on four study areas that currently have several different zoning schedules, in the north west, north east, south west and central areas of the city. There were over 1,000 attendees and 3,300 online surveys completed. A variety of tools were presented for feedback. The City will now compile all the data and responses and a report to Council on findings is expected for March 2017.

Arbutus Greenway



The Arbutus Corridor was originally the site of an important rail line through Vancouver's west side beginning in the 1900s, seeing both industrial and passenger use through a century of service. Unused for transport since the early

2000s, the community gardens and subsequent green space that grew over time came to also have significance for the community. Recently the City asked for ideas and feedback regarding the design of a new greenspace that makes use of the Arbutus Corridor.
